## NOTICE.

Headquarters, Annapolis, Md., May 12th, 1863. 
The evils resulting from the unrestricted sale of Spirituous Liquous to Soldiers, as now practiced, are such as to destroy, to a great extent, military discipline, endanger the peace and good order of this City and the Campsiand Barracks in its vicinity, and to seriously impair the health and efficiency of the men.

To correct this condition of things, all persons residing in the District of Annapolis are bereby most residing in the District of Annapolis are bereby most residing in the District of Annapolis.

To correct this condition of things, all persons residing in the District of Annapolis, are hereby most positively forbidden to sell, or give, to any enlisted man in the military service of the United States, spirituous liquors or intoxicating drinks of any kind whatever, without the written permission of a Medical officer in charge of a Hospital, or some Commissioned officer who is in command of a Camp, Post or detached Company, which permission must state the exact quantity authorized to be given or sold.

Those who disregard this rotice and continue the practice of selling intoxicating liquors to enlisted men, without permission, will be dealt with by the Provost Marshal in such manner as is authorized by the Laws of Congress, and sanctioned by the War Department.

Then acordance with the above notice, I hereby forbid the sale of all spirituous, intoxicating or malt Liquors to any non-commissioned Officers, private soldiers, or men wearing United States uniform, except as named in the above notice.

Then Any hotel keepers, taverns, oyter-houses, restaurants or stores, where Liquors are sold either in large or small quantities, allowing such intoxicating, spirituous or malt Liquors to be drain, upon their premises by any non-commissioned officer, or private soldier of the United States, will be held subject to the penalties hereafter named.

¶ III.—Any such hotel keepers, taverns, oyster-houses, restaurants or stores, violating this order, shall be subject to the following penalty: The confiscation of their stock of liquors, and house closed.

¶ IV.—Any persons selling any such intoxicating, spirituous or malt liquors to any non-commissioned officer or private soldier of the United States, without license, will, in addition to the fine imposed upon them by the civil authorities for the violations of the laws of the State of Maryland, be imprisoned for sixty days and their stock of Liquor confiscated.

¶ W.—Any citizen or negro found purchasing lany intoxicating, spirituous or malt Liquors, for the purpose of giving it to any non-commissioned officer, private soldier, or men wearing the United States uniform, will be dealt with as disposing of liquor without license.
