

ITEMS—GENERAL AND LOCAL.

We just learn as going to press that Chief Steward J. A. Broome, has been ordered to report at Annapolis Junction for duty.

Our columns are still open to all who desire to aid our paper; especially to that writing corps, that carried "the Knapsack" so ably and successfully, and did so much execution in its field of action.

We hope some of our contributors will excuse us for declining their articles. We would remind them that they must write on one side of the sheet, cross all their i's, and dot all their t's; as we cannot be responsible for bad manuscript. A better selection of subjects, is also requisite.

Our band is in operation. They have received a set of splendid instruments, sufficient for eighteen performers, and are under the instruction of Prof. DEEMS of Baltimore, who meets his class several times a week. They have made a good beginning, and we hope soon to be able to announce a good programme for public amusement. We are told that there is some good talent in the band, and such an announcement may be looked for at no very remote day.

We notice the arrival of several Steamers during the week, the *Star*, the *Wawaset* and the *Nellie Pence*, laden with Commissary and Quartermaster stores; and the others bringing troops. The Rail Road Company, and the Quartermaster are busy transporting supplies to the camps near this City. At present this entire Department is quite active, and every man in its employ has as much as he can well attend to, and finds but little time to be idle. We presume this activity will increase as the camps fill up with troops. The wet weather has made the roads bad for waggoning, and the Rail Road does most of the transporting.

It will be seen by our list of changes, that twenty more of those unfortunate victims to Rebel cruelty have died since our last report. There are still a large number of very sick patients, of those remaining in Hospital. It is hardly possible that all will survive, yet it is hoped the mortality of last week will be much lessened. The cold and wet weather of the week has been much against those suffering from diseases of the lungs, and probable has had a depressing effect upon all. A few days of bright sunshine will make a wonderful change, in their appearance, and feeling; and cause the powers of their frail bodies to recuperate faster. This is a bad season of the year for invalids. It is peculiar for its rapid reverses, and extremes of temperature, which make it a great test to the vigor of the constitution.

We hear that the people of Maryland are working with great promptness, and earnestness for the State Fair for the benefit of the Christian and Sanitary Commissions, to be held in Baltimore, April 18th, prox.—Our Hospital has not responded as well as we could have expected, and we urge all who desire to make contributions of whatever kind or quality they may have, to do so at once, as the time is drawing near for its commencement. Anything from the battle field will be of interest, and we presume that there are many soldiers whose attention has not been drawn to, and who only need be reminded of this fact, to enable them to bring forward their mites. Let all remember that in contributing to this fund it is more than possible he may reap before the war is over, its especial benefit.

Up to the time of going to press we have no tidings of the Flag-of-Truce Steamer *New York*, which was due here, if the exchange had continued regularly, on Wednesday. We had hoped another boat load would have been transported on this side the war lines and nearer life, but we are disappointed, they have not arrived, and we know not how soon to expect them. Is it possible, are we compelled to believe, that the rebels are determined to permit our men to die—to die in this inhuman manner; are we forced to wipe from our minds every consideration that will place them in equality with our race, or make them possessed of any honorable feelings? Forbid it—and yet how can we extenuate, how can we alter the verdict so plainly rendered by our land that these things must be so.

Sensitiveness.

Sensitiveness is thought by some, to be a great misfortune. It is thought to be a morbid feeling, engendered by pride, superciliousness, or affectation, and not the offspring of a logical mind, or of a purely generous, affectionate heart; and will render the possessor of it unhappy in proportion to the amount of it he possesses.—But we do not agree to all that is said about it. There may be a morbid sensibility to affront, or suspiciousness that takes the world unkindly, or looks at it in a misanthropic point of view, but this is not true sensitiveness. And again, some persons may have a higher opinion of themselves than they ought to have, and ask more than they deserve, and more than their acquaintances, and the world at large are willing to accord them.—Such persons may have a form of sensitiveness, or rather irritability, whenever their claims are disregarded, and they do not receive that respect, have that homage paid them to which they lay claim, and think themselves entitled. This kind of sensibility is a weakness. It arises from a want of proper appreciation of men and things, of the common relations of life, and its manifest duties. The sensitiveness we mean has a much higher significance. It is innate, a heart-feeling; it is made of the most delicate material, it breathes pure air, and is nourished by pure sentiment. It is holy, heavenly, divine. It is the opposite of all that is evil and impure. It shudders at profanity, it shrinks at blasphemy, it hides itself from the blackness of human crime. It is as the sentinel upon the watch-tower, ready to give the first alarm; it is a shield of protection; it is a wall of defense. It keeps out the rude, and the rough; it has no companionship with the vulgar, and obscene; or with wantonness, and vice. It feels the touch of these, as the flower the burning rays, and closes its leaves against them. It bars the entrances, and closes the windows of the heart, against all intrusion: it dwells there with the affections. It admits not the unknown; it lets none in but the pure; it commits itself to none but those born of the same fabric—the honest, and true. If you would know it, you must become like it. You must come with sweet smiles, and tender words; you must knock for entrance with an honest purpose, and demean yourself with kindly graces towards it. This kind of sensitiveness is a virtue. It is the real distinguishing mark. The possessor of it may seem lonely, but it is not so, he has resources of happiness unknown to others. His associates may be few, but they are congenial; his field of operations may be circumscribed, but his work is well done; his words may be few, but they are reliable; his affections may be hard to attain, but when once secured, it is devotion, and beats in unison. He is pure, good, and true, worthy of confidence, and worth knowing. Whoever is thus sensitive need not be ashamed of it. The opinions of weakness, and imbecility, do not reach such, as they dwell in the sunlight of real existence, and from the world apart.
