Share, for the purpose of building a Bridge ac-  
ross the River Patuxent, at the place where the  
Lower Ferry is now kept, called Portland, in  
Baltimore county, over said river into Ann Ar-  
undel county—Will proceed to open subscrip-

city of Baltimore, on MONDAY, the 30th day

same days and hours above mentioned—and the

Snowden's bridge, at the Furnace, on the north  
side of the present Federal road, is 16 1/2 miles  
and 60 perches; and this over road is a dry  
dry, even country—That we shall be enabled  
to travel from Baltimore to Washington, and  
ral City, in 39 miles, besides the great conveni-  
ty of road, whereas the present road is gen-  
rally estimated at 45 miles.  
These natural advantages, added to a new  
law and charter of incorporation for the Bridge  
Company, by the legislature of Maryland, in  
their last session, who viewed it as of the  
most importance to the interest of the  
Baltimore and Ann Arundel county, as well as  
the public in general, must assuredly prove  
productive fund to the stockholders.
