The Commissioners being led to remark, that for the satisfaction and information of the public, they have had the road run by Mr. John Bounding, his attested plat of which is lodged at Mr. Evans's, whereby it will appear, that the distance from Mr. Evans's tavern, in the city of Baltimore, to the Ferry landing, at Portland, is 24 miles and 70 perches, from thence across the river is 2 of the mile and 41 perches, and from the foot of the contemplated bridge, on the Ann Arundel side of the river, in a straight line to Snowden's bridge, at the Furnace, where it intersects the present Federal road, is 16 3/4 miles and 60 perches, and this over remarkably level, dry, even country.—Thus we shall be enabled to travel from Baltimore to Washington, the Federal City, in 39 miles, besides the great superiority of road, whereas the present road is generally estimated at 45 miles.

Those natural advantages, added to a liberal law and charter of incorporation to this Bridge Company, by the legislature of Maryland, at their last session, who viewed it as of the utmost importance to the interest of the city of Baltimore and Ann Arundel county, as well as to the public in general, must assuredly prove a productive fund to the stockholders.
