SHIP NEWS

Port of Baltimore.

Brig SUBARVA, Bennett, Antigua
Sch'r Hazard, Cavenden, Edenton

The brig Adelin Henry, of Baltimore, was left at St. Pierre (Martin) the late evening.
A pilot boat schooner 3 days from Baltimore, bound to St. Thomas, supposed to be the Antelope, was spoken in lat. 32, long. 72.

Boston, December 21.

Arrived, ship Perseverance, Collesworth 100 days from St. Petersburg, and 45 from Norway. The ship Arthur, Page, for Providence, sailed October 5; ship Columbia, Wood, getting under way, bound for Baltimore, both from Norway.

New-York, December 30.

Arrived since our last.
Ship Pennsylvania, Middle, of Philadelphia, in 92 days from Antwerp, in distress for provisions. Captain R brought home part of the crew of the ship Wilmington, of Philadelphia, lost on the coast of Holland.

English ship George, Simpson in 55 days from Greenock. Left no vessels there for New York. December 20th, in lat. 28, long. 67, spoke ship Vulture, Dille 7 days from Philadelphia for St. Anns. 21st, spoke a ship from Baltimore for Cork, out 7 days.

Schooner Augusta, Smith 4 days from Ocracoke. In a severe gale of wind; from the 21st to the 24th inst. the schooner Two Brothers, of Edenton, for Baltimore, crew vessel and cargo totally lost; a Spanish brig from St. Jago de Cuba, for New York, sent her boat aloft with the supercargo and 4 men for a pilot, the whole of whom were lost, the brig went aloft, but has been since got off; brig Mary Torren, from Turk's Island, with salt for Newbern, N.C. went ashore and bilged; schooner Vinal with shingles for Baltimore, bilged; Biffel, of Edenton for the West Indies totally lost. Wallitt, of Newbern, bilged; Gillen, from Edenton, for New York, totally lost; and 2 other schooners names not known.

Brig Hercules, Myers, in 34 days from New Orleans, and 28 days from the Balize. Left there, brig Hope, with ms. for Bordeaux; the ship Thomas Wilton, Churnader, failed November 26 for Liverpool; left ship Almira Remington, for do; the schooner Hiram, failed in co. for New York and the schooner Eliza, Tice, for Philadelphia. December 25, from the capes of Virginia spoke ship Dispatch, Aimes, out 3 days from New York for Havannah, from whom we got a supply of provisions, and captain A. informed us, he saw the day before a schooner bottom upwards off the Havanna; spoke schooner Newman, Hayt, out 4 days from New Orleans, for Liverpool. Met in the river, bound up to Orleans, the brig Friendship out 20 days from New York; and brig Friends Adventure, from do off the Balize, spoke the brig Washington, from Bordeaux, dismasted for New Orleans.

Brig Revolution, Dayton, in 30 days from Kingston, (Jam.) The brig Marv, Avery, of Portsmouth, and schooner Ruby, McIntosh, failed 4 days before, for Exuma; for salt—they had been sent into Jamaica by the English frigate Diana, on their passage from America, to Curacao—brig Alert, Smith, of Baltimore for Curacao, had also been sent in, was vessel, and had sailed for Cuba—the sch'r Betsy Holland Nicholls failed two days before, for Newbern, N.C. the brig Betsy for Baltimore, failed in co. the Generous Friends, Chammings, to fall in a few days for New York; schooner Jone, Wallis, just arrived from Newbern; sloop Louisa, Bowers, of Somerset, failed

in co. for Charleston; and the schooner John, Williams, of New York for Jamaica. Left there, brig Mary, of Newport; brig Nancies, Pepper, of Alexandria; ship Eliza, Evans, of Norfolk; schooner Rodmas, Macnarras, of Alexandria, for Curacao, sent in and condemned; schooner Favorite, Pinckham of New York; brig spwing Bourne, of do; and sch'r Goby, of Philadelphia, all for Curacao, sent in by the Diana frigate, for a wrech of blockade and to have a trial the 30th Dec. The sch'r Fair Play, Robbins from New York for Curacao, had also been captured, but had not arrived in lat. 21, long. 85, spoke sch'r Five Brothers, of Sunbury, out 60 days from Bordeaux, for New Orleans; the had been plundered by a French privateer off Port Antonio, the privateer had on board, the mate and one man of the ship Victoria, from New Orleans for Europe; they had also plundered the sch'r Mary, Drury, from Jamaica, for New Orleans Dec. 13, off the Havanna, spoke the ship Nancy, out 18 days from Savannah; the Nancy failed in co. with the brig Cato, Upske, for New York; and the ship Margaret, Cunningham, for do. December 27, spoke the sch'r Nancy out 24 hours from Wilmington, for Greenock.

Schr Liberty, Randlett, in 20 days from Balsaterre, St Kitts. Left there schooner Hannah Griffin, Jenkins, to fail next day for Philadelphia; ship James, Warner, of do to fail in 10 days for Charleston. December 15, was brought to by the English frigate Fortunat for Jamaica. 8th spoke ship Pepper, of bottom, from Charleston for Liverpool, out 7 days. The following American vessels arrived at Port Spain from the 1st of October to the 10th November, but were open. Winslow, Philadelphia, and 25th; schooner Jolly Bacchus, Harper, do, in 37 days; schooner Sampson, do, Alexandria; Governor White Dorgan, New York, in 41 days; Favorite, Stevens do, 45 days called at Demarara, but could not fill and proceeded to Barbadoes; brig Star, Nowel Newburyport, in 38 days, struck on the Cumber's Rocks and must be hove down; brig Planter, Young, Portsmouth, Courier Daggett, Norfolk; Merchant, Cotton, New London; schooner Ariel, Cowley, do, brig Bels Hamilton Dupet, and lost the greater part of her deck load; Diana, Woods, New Bedford Eliza and one, Russel Baltimore in 27 days; schooner Victory, silver, do, in 38; schooner Sally, Freeman, Boston, called at Demarara; Flora, Jones, do, in 30 days Lumber in demand.

Schooner Franklin, Ridgeway, in 18 days from Baltimore. The Franklin got no damage on Dennis reef.
Schooner Nancy, Atwater, in 11 days from Martinique and 16 from St. Kitts. Left ship Olive, of New York going to winward to load; ship Bellona, Wilton, of do, brig Agnora Van Antwerp, for New York in 12 days; brig Nopareil, 28 days from New London; brig President Jefferson, for New York, in 12 days; brig Cynthia, Andrews, of Salem, had 4 men pressed going in by the British brig Courier who put 4 men on board from the doctors list. Left many other American vessels, names not known.

Left schooner Cornelia, to fail next day for New York; ship Osiris Saunders, of New York, for Liverpool; brig Berts, Record, of do, for Antigua, put in leaky with the loss of her foremast—Dec 16 lat 23 long. 68 spoke brig Angel Smith, 13 days from Philadelphia for the Spanish Main. On Thursday last spoke the schooner Hazard, 5 days from Bolton for North Carolina. Markets dull at St. Bartholomews.

Schooner Eliza, Throp, in four days from Washington, N.C. Sailed in co. schooner Augusta, with schooner Allen, and sloop Dispatch, all for New York. There had fourteen vessels gone ashore on the 20th December in a gale at Ocracoke, a Spanish brig, captain Filber; 11 schooners and one sloop most of which filled—one sch'r. belonging to Carolina rolled up to over, and all hands perished.

Captain Maley of the schooner Mount Vernon informs, that his vessel was captured on the 11th Oct. near Tortuga by a French privateer, himself and crew taken out, tript of the rull, the wife's papers destroy'd or detained, and the vessel sent in to Caye port near Barraca, and there left with her cargo, without trial or delay. After being detained near a month on board the privateer, captain M. his crew and the supercargo, Mr. John Aldwell, of this city, were put ashore about 40 miles from St. Jago-de-Cuba, and after many difficulties reached that place, where all died except himself and boy. He left St. Jago on board the brig Ceres, the 7th inst and left there the ship Clarif of New York, discharging, and sch'r Lyda, of Norfolk. The brig Two Brothers, of Baltimore failed 3 days and brig Eliza (former y of this port) under Spanish colors, 10 days before for this port—11 privateers of and from 3 to 7 guns each, were fitting, and many from different ports in Cuba were cruising. Captain Maley saw a list of 97 privateers out of that island, several had received Spanish commissions since the capture of Spanish vessels by the Haytians. Jack Mathew, with a sloop brig and a schooner, was ready to sail; it was reported that orders had been recently received from Guadalupe not to make prizes of American vessels unless their papers clearly proved they were bound to Hayti or found within half a mile of the shore of Hispaniola.
