The cause of this outrage on the peace of our city, we know not, but expect it will be discovered, as soon, if not more, of the blacks suspected of committing it, are said to have been sent to goal.

On Thursday evening last, between the hours of eight and nine o'clock James Belger, in a wanton and cruel manner, discharged the contents of a blunderbuss, or large pistol, at Thomas Flavanian, in his own yard, and wounded him in several places, and he now lies without the expectation of recovery. James Belger immediately after wounding Mr. Flavanian, ran off.

The following is a description of his person: He is aged about 30 years, 5 feet 8 inches high, slender in his person and thin visage; had neither coat, shoes nor stockings when he made off.

#### NEW-HAMPSHIRE LEGISLATURE.

IN SENATE.  
Messrs. ALCOCK, SMITH, and PAYSON, to whom was committed the governor's Speech, having reported the following answer, the same was accepted, and a committee appointed to present it to his Excellency.

May it please your Excellency,

The free suffrages of your fellow citizens having called you to fill the office of Chief Executive Magistrate for the present year; we, who consider ourselves the public servants of our constituents, acting for them according to the best of our understandings, deem it incumbent on us to express the general satisfaction enjoyed, on your accepting that important trust, so congenial to the wishes of the State. We, in common with our fellow citizens, place entire confidence in your fidelity, not in the least doubting, but those ready talents which in so many and various instances have been manifested, both in our national and state governments, will, with your usual promptitude and correctness, be employed in co-operating with us, for protecting and securing the freedom, independence and happiness of the people.

Although, Sir, with you, we lament that unhappy differences in political sentiment, which has so long pervaded the Union: Yet with pleasure we congratulate our fellow citizens on the present happy appearance of Union, so congenial to the first principles of our Revolution.

Your candid and open declaration of your political sentiments, must be considered as a guarantee to the citizens of this State, that your administration will be conducted agreeably to the happy Republican Constitutions under which we live.

We have the pleasure of agreeing in sentiment with your excellency, that a free elective Government, like ours, originating in the people, is the strongest, the freest, and the best that has ever yet been experienced—and that the people may safely place their utmost confidence in the wise, virtuous and magnanimous administration, by whom the affairs of the Union are now conducted. And we flatter ourselves, that the honest and virtuous part of our fellow citizens will unite their best endeavours in discountenancing that spirit of malignant abuse, which has been, and still continues, in many parts of the Union, to be poured forth by the tongue of slander, against that wise and virtuous chief, who still continues to preside over our national affairs.

We consider it a desirable object, that the public mind should be directed to those sources, from whence true and correct information proceed;—which will tend greatly to harmonize our political sentiments, and secure more firmly to ourselves and posterity those civil and religious rights which we have hitherto enjoyed.

True it is, the unparalleled prosperity of our country, as it respects agriculture, commerce and manufactures; the acquisition of that important territory—Louisiana; and the complete arrangement, and faithful application of our national finances; together with the prevailing tranquillity of the times, must fill the heart of every thinking citizen with the most unfeigned thankfulness towards HIM who is the Supreme Disposer of all events.

Should we find that the public and private interest of the state should make it necessary to have another session, the duty we owe to our constituents will compel us to adopt the measure. Economy, in the management of public affairs, must be very desirable to the citizens at large; yet parsimony may be attended with as great or greater evils than prodigality: therefore, we think it our duty to raise such sums as will fully answer the exigencies of the state.

Some further arrangements, we are fully convinced, ought soon to be adopted, for placing the militia of this State on such a footing as shall make it more completely answer the purpose of the institution: In a Democratic Republic, which we conceive to be the true definition of our own, we deem it highly important, that the interest of the citizen and soldier should be one and the same, whereby they will prevent the necessity of standing mercenary troops; and will, like the Citizens of America, our departed WASHINGTON, be ready to return the sword into the scabbard, when the use of it is no longer required in defence of their country.

We doubt not of your ready concurrence with us in all such acts and resolves as shall be passed, tending to the safety and advantage of the citizens; and uniting with our best endeavors to harmonize the public mind, by every honest exertion in promoting the tranquillity and happiness of our common country.
