A SUBSCRIBER.

Extract of a letter from a facetious old Hag, in Philadelphia, to his friend in this city, dated July 11, 1866.

DEAR SIR, Having observed in the different papers both here and in other places, various remarks on that "hideous and terrific monster," the Lombardy poplar worm. Portland, July 7.

Arrived, schooner Federal, Cole, from St. Croix; ship Live Oak, Blake, 32 days from St. Jago; schooner Hannah, Chase, 20 days from St. Martins. Two days after leaving St. Martins, was brought to by the British frigate Mermaid, who sent a lieutenant on board, and closely examined the captain and crew to find a pretence to make the schooner a prize, upon noticing a Dutchman who was passenger, he carried him on board the Mermaid, when he readily informed the captain of the frigate that he had property upon freight in the Hannah, whereupon captain Chase's people, except his mate and a boy, were taken out, and a prize-master and seven men were put on board his vessel, and ordered for Halifax. On the 23d, one of the men fell overboard and was drowned. On Thursday last, being in lat. 41, upon George's Bank, Mr. Newbury Morse (the mate) informed the captain that he had prevailed on one of the seamen which had been put on board, to assist in re-taking the vessel, which they effected on the evening of the same day, by getting possession of the pistols, swords, &c. and fastening the door of the cabin, in which the prize-master and two of the men were asleep, they then proceeded on deck, and compelled the other three to surrender, and to assist in getting the vessel into this port, which they reached on Saturday last. To the spirited conduct of the captain and mate, the owners are indebted for the preservation of the property; for if their vessel had been carried into Halifax (if she had escaped condemnation) the detention and expence of a trial would have amounted to nearly the same thing.
