FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

By the *Niired, arrived at New York from Halifax.*

HALIFAX, July 8.
Arrived, Princess Mary packet, Capt. Pocock, with the mails from Falmouth; 25 days.

Sailed since our last:
His majesty's ships Tartar, Driver, and Indian. His majesty's brig Nimble, for England, with dispatches and a mail.
His majesty's ship Ville de Milan, vice admiral the hon. G. C. Berkeley, captain Sir Robt. Lawrie, passed Falmouth on the 3d of June, with the ship Heroine under her convoy.

A squadron of 6 sail of the line, 2 frigates and 2 brigs, under sir J. B. Warren, sailed from Portsmouth, June 4—destined, as is said, for an expedition to the West Indies.

Lord Melville's trial was ended; but the result not publicly known—A letter received at Falmouth, mentioned that he was acquitted by a majority of 66 to 44.

LONDON, May 25.
The method of punishing the seamen on board the men of war, by running the gauntlet, is ordered to be immediately discontinued.

The Mercury frigate is appointed convoy to the Newfoundland trade.

Sir R. Strachan sailed from Plymouth on Monday morning, with the following ships under his command: Montague, Ferrible, Bellona, Audacious, Belleisle, and Triumph; and Decade and Melampus frigates. This squadron is gone in pursuit of Jerome Bonaparte's squadron.

Sir Sidney Smith, with the Pompee, & three frigates, has arrived off Sicily; all apprehensions of attack upon that island by the French must be at an end. It is stated that Sir Sidney has succeeded in throwing supplies into Gaeta.

Commodore Sir Home Popham had the address to secure Bonaparte's dispatches to Ad. Linois on board Le Voltaire, which have been transmitted to our Board of Admiralty.

The Piedmontese French ship of 80 guns from Toulon, with dispatches, was going into the Cape of Good Hope, but being informed by a Dane that it was in possession of the English, she proceeded for the Isle of France.

The French have not changed their position in Germany, nor has Prussia made any further attempt on Pomerania.

The Russians are strengthening and extending themselves in Dalmatia, and are on the eve of taking possession of Zara, which is the capital of that province. It thus appears that the emperor Alexander is determined to oppose the further advances of the French in that quarter.

Louis Bonaparte, the intended King of Holland, is now dangerously ill at Paris.

History will remark, that the three Admirals, English, Spanish and French, engaged in the battle of Trafalgar, have all lost their lives. The English admiral was killed outright; Admiral Gravina died of the wounds he received; and the French Admiral finished his mortal career by his own hand.

The Estrella, from Vera Cruz, for Cadiz has been captured by the Fame, Polyphemus, and Africamen of war, and sent into Plymouth. The Estrella is laden with cochineal and dollars, and is supposed to be one of the richest prizes taken during the war.

May 31.
Government, after having shewn great tardiness, in publishing the royal order for granting letters of marque against the navigation of Prussia and Popenburg, is equally slow in the execution of that order, and in maintaining it to its utmost extent. This order, agreed to on the 14th of this month by his majesty in council, and published on the 20th in the London Gazette, was not sent until yesterday by the court of admiralty to be carried into execution. Besides, before this denuncie dispatch, it has been materially altered by another royal order, agreed to by his majesty in council, on the 21st of this month, and published in the Gazette of the 28th. This second order, which bears title of "Act Additional to the act of the 14th of May," makes an important and remarkable change, by the reserving for the navigation of the Baltic, & to the commerce carried on there, the same liberty which England has to the present time allowed to that navigation and commerce. The following is the tenor of the additional act:

G. R. The Instructions to the Commanders of all Ships of War and armed vessels who may have received from our Court of St. James, Letters of Marque have been extended as follows—

"As we have been always animated with a wish to prevent whatever might have a tendency to annoy the commerce of those with whom we are at peace, as well as to promote the necessary operations of war; and as these objects will be more effectually answered if the present state of the commerce and navigation of the Baltic remain uninterrupted: We have judged it expedient and resolve accordingly, that our ships of war and other armed vessels, and all vessels holding commissions from us shall henceforth abstain from taking or intercepting any ships or vessels, navigating the said sea; ordering and enjoining, besides, to the commanders of all vessels having letters of marque and reprisal not to intercept in the Baltic, by virtue of their commission or under their flag, any ship or vessel with the intention of seizing her; but on the contrary, to suffer such ships or vessels as they may fall in with in that sea, to continue their voyage to their respective places of destination without the least restraint whatever.

June 1.
Thursday seven waggons loaded with casks of specie arrived at the Bank of England under the escort of a party of light horse. The casks contained the 400,000 l. in dollars sent some time since to Hanover, and which have been got away before the Prussians took possession of that country. On their way to London they halted at Rumford, when one of the centinels placed over the waggons was detected in breaking open one of the casks and lodged a prisoner in the barracks.

June 4.
WAR WITH PRUSSIA.
On Friday letters of marque and reprisals were issued at the admiralty, to capture or destroy all Prussian and Popenburg vessels, except those to which his majesty's licence had been granted—The greatest exertions are making by the board of admiralty, and the subordinate departments, to augment our naval force: no less than eleven sail of the line, now in ordinary at different ports, are to be immediately commissioned.

June 7.
A cartel has arrived from France, bringing over Lord Elgin and Yarmouth. The cartel is said to have brought dispatches for Government; but nothing has transpired on the subject.

Some naval equipments have recently been ordered by the Danish Government to take place at Copenhagen.—Letters from Lisbon state, that on the 19th of April, a treaty by which the neutrality of Portugal was guaranteed, was signed at Madrid between the Plenipotentiaries of France and Portugal. The latter, no doubt, has been under the necessity of punishing the forbearance of the enemy at a high rate; but any pecuniary sacrifice was to be preferred to the visitations of a French army.

PARIS, June 6.
Yesterday, afternoon, his majesty the emperor gave a solemn audience to the ambassador of the Sublime Porte and of Holland, also to the members of the extraordinary commission sent by the Batavian Government.

His imperial highness Prince Lewis came also at the same time in great state to the palace of the Thuilleries.

The ambassador from the Sublime Porte has delivered to the Emperor and Empress the presents which his highness had charged him to offer to their majesties. They consist of for the Emperor, white horses richly caparisoned; and for the Empress, a casket of Jewellery.

It is believed that his imperial highness Prince Louis will set out for Holland early next week.

LEYDEN, June 5.
Letters from the empire brings the two following important articles of intelligence, viz. The choice made by the elector archchancellor of a condjutor in the person of Cardinal Felch; and the formal renunciation by Prussia to Bavaria on the 27th May, of the county of Anspach, which has since been in consequence evacuated by the French troops.

NAPLES, May 12.
The day of the 11th of this month will be an epocha in the annals of Naples. On that day Prince Joseph Napoleon of France made his entry into this capital, in quality of King of Naples and Sicily, with the greatest pomp. The day was terminated by a general illumination of the city, and illumination which will be repeated this day and to-morrow.

Further extracts from Dutch papers to the 9th June, received at New-York.

HAGUE, June 5.
His excellency Mr. R. T. Schimmelpennick has this day resigned his post of chief pensionary, in the special and extraordinary assembly, by the following letter:—

My Lords and High Mightinesses,
Inasmuch as I have found but too just reason, owing to the debilitated state of my health for some time past, and particularly the apparent deprivation of my eye-sight, to withdraw from the arduousness of business, still the consideration of my duty, and the encouraging hope of being of real benefit to my country, has till now withheld me therefrom; to which the situation wherein this country found itself during the late renewal of war, which brought the enemy on our frontiers, rendered this step at that period often less proper. At present, my lord, these weighty reasons not existing any longer, and the conviction that by further services in my present state, and the situation of public affairs, I could not be more of any real benefit to my country, I have resolved to leave a post for which I conceive myself no longer fitted to be of use to my fellow-citizens.

I therefore have recourse to the privilege granted in art. 41 of the constitution, and resigned by this my appointment, as grand pensionary to this assembly of your high mightinesses.

I leave this post with inward convictions to have attempted, as much as depended from me, what tended to the welfare of my fellow-citizens. I leave it impressed with the most grateful acknowledgment for the many proofs of confidence which the

assembly and my fellow-citizens have reposed in me. I acknowledge for it to all the members of the assembly, and through your high mightinesses, to the whole nation, my sincere gratitude, with assurance that the pleasing recollection will attend me in this my retreat.

And with this parting from the close connection in which my appointment had placed me to the assembly of your high mightinesses, I pray the Almighty will take under his special care and protection my country, which will ever be above all dear to me, promote the welfare of its inhabitants, and that your high mightinesses, both in your persons and families, may experience her blessings.

REGENBURG, May 8.
This day the directorial minister the baron of Alburn, gave notice to the imperial diet that the prince elector arch-chancellor, his master, having reached the 63d year of his age, judge it expedient to choose a coadjutor and successor, and for which he requested his holiness to appoint cardinal Leach, uncle to the French emperor, to which monarch, as also to the sovereign of the German empire, notice of this choice had been given.

LONDON, May 26.
It is at length positively determined, that lord Harrington shall go to Ireland as commander in chief, for which country his lordship will shortly depart, attended by his staff. Though not finally settled, it is strongly believed, that lord Cathcart will take the command in Scotland.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, MAY 23.
Thanks to the managers of the Impeachment. The secretary at war rose, and moved, "That the thanks of this house be given to those members who were appointed managers of the impeachment of lord viscount Melville, for their faithful management of the trust reposed in them."

The question was put, and was carried with one dissentient voice.

The speaker then rose to return thanks to the managers, who rose also; he addressed them to the following effect:—

"Gentlemen,
This house has, upon the result of so great and important an enquiry respecting the administration of the expenditure of the public money, come to a resolution to enter upon the most grave and solemn of all its functions, and resort to its prerogative of impeachment against Henry Lord Viscount Melville. It is the power of impeachment which has enabled this commons of this country, at all times, to lay open the misdeeds of the highest servants of the crown, and to prevent, or punish, all inroads which may be made upon the liberty of the subjects of this realm. In the prosecution of this impeachment, the house has appointed you to prepare and arrange the proofs of the complicated transactions on which their charges were grounded.—Their charges were against a noble person, whose rank and high consideration in the state must hold him forth as a signal example either of good or evil. Throughout the progress of the trial, they have witnessed, with peculiar satisfaction, your great attention and dispatch, which have rescued the trial by impeachment from the disgrace to which it had fallen, and restored it to its former strength and honor.—They have witnessed in you an unwearied diligence in the discharge of the trust committed to you, a singular sagacity in discovering the proofs, a boldness which so properly belongs to the commons of the united kingdom; a strength of argument, and a power of eloquence, which threw the light of day upon dark, secret, and criminal transactions. The final issue of this trial now remains for another body. It is before one of the highest of human tribunals; it is the house of lords which is to determine ultimately the condemnation or acquittal of the person accused. Be the final issue what it may, you have done your duty. You have satisfied the expectations that the house had formed of you, and you have deserved their approbation and their thanks. I am ordered by the house to communicate to you the approbation and thanks of the house for the faithful management of the trust reposed in you."

The secretary at war then said, that although he had the pain of hearing one dissenting voice to this vote of thanks, he hoped he should hear none to the motion he was about to make. He moved "that the speaker be requested to print the speech which he had just made to the managers of the impeachment."

June 3

By the last accounts received from North America, we find, that our frigates which cruise off Sandy Hook have again given cause of serious complaint, (alluding to the conduct of the Leander and Cambrian in the murder of Pierce.) We still doubt the correctness of all the reports which are published in the American papers. We are in the meanwhile extremely anxious to learn what has really passed, as every Englishman must feel particularly interested, where the true honor of his country is at stake, and the report which has reached us of the murder of Pierce is but too well calculated to justify the serious complaints which have of late been made by foreign nations, against the conduct of our cruisers.
