Mr. PUGH, In your paper of the 22d inst. a writer under the signature of Ogdencen has made his appearance in vindication of the political conduct of Mr. Ogdin, whilst he acted in the character of a representative of Baltimore county to the General Assembly of the State.—Whether this man is really fit to be a public Delegate or clothed with the important trust of Legislation, is an enquiry which he himself has invited, and which it is no less the right than the duty of the public to institute. As to the oratory of Mr. Ogdin, I never yet knew that he possessed claims upon that score, nor did I suppose that the most infatuated advocate he could enlist in the service of a lottery cause would dare to hazard the assertion, that upon that ground he could challenge the public patronage and support. If the vagaries of a distempered fancy, and the incoherencies of an eccentric mind, continually tossed about in the whirl of extravagance, can claim the distinguished character and appellation of the quence, then I will admit that Mr. Ogdin ought to receive the confidence of the people of Baltimore county, upon the ground of superior eloquence—but so long as sound knowledge shall be deemed essential to genuine oratory Mr. O. must stand condemned in the public estimation. It is true, there is a rule which compels every member to speak to the question; but it was very early discovered; nay, I believe it was plainly perceived in the very first essay of Mr. O. that a rigorous execution of this rule would partially disfranchise his constituents, and condemn their delegate to dumb legislation and eye lasting silence. In tender consideration therefore of the peculiar case of this man, and in mercy to what appeared to be the predominant passion of his soul, the rule was frequently relaxed to give him an opportunity of venting his effusions, no doubt to the great gratification of himself, and certainly to the no small amusement of his audience. It is not true that new taxes were contemplated to be imposed upon the people of Baltimore county to complete the road from Belle Air to the city of Baltimore, as has been asserted by this champion enlisted in the cause of Mr. Ogdin; a recurrence to the law will shew that the work was to be entirely conducted under the direction and controul of the Levy Court, and that the law was only to be carried into effect in case the surplus funds provided for the support of the criminals, should be sufficient to defray the expenses of the undertaking. With respect to Mr. Ayres's road, which it seems the thunders of Mr. O's eloquence crushed in embryo; it is not recollected that any bold figures of oratory were introduced by this Cicero of Maryland upon that occasion, save the figure of a Wolf, which Mr. Ayres answered with the appropriate metaphor of a Rabbit. Ogdin avowed that such was the nature of the ground, that it was impossible even by a Wolf without incurring serious danger of its life, whilst Mr. Ayres assured the house that he was perfectly acquainted with the true location and situation of the ground, having frequently, in his juvenile days, been there, engaged in the pleasing sport of hunting rabbits. But, justice compels me to say, that Mr. Ogdin also took an opportunity of telling the house, upon this occasion, that he was skilled in the art of surveying, for he solemnly assured them, that he had carefully located it with his mathematical instruments, thereby hoping to discomfit the efforts of Mr. Ayres, who could plead no such nice calculation and strict admeasurement. But nevertheless, these high and imposing pretensions of Mr. Ogdin would not eventually have availed, but for the plain, sensible, and convincing
