All persons assured by this company, sustaining any loss or damage by fire, are forthwith to give notice to the company's agent, and as soon as possible after, to deliver in as particular account of their loss or damage, signed by their own hands, as the nature of the case will admit of, and make proof of the same by their oath or affirmation, and by their books of accounts, or other proper vouchers, as shall be reasonably required; and shall procure a certificate, under the hand of a magistrate or sworn notary of the city or district in which the fire happened, not concerned in such loss, importing that they are acquainted with the character and circumstances of the person or persons insured, and do know, or verily believe, that he, she, or they, really, and by misfortune, without any kind of fraud or evil practice, have sustained by such fire, loss and damage to the amount therein mentioned; and until such affidavit and certificates are produced, the loss money shall not be payable; also, if there appears any fraud or false swearing, the claimant shall forfeit his claim to restitution or payment, by virtue of his policy.

In case any difference or dispute shall arise between the assured and the company, touching any loss or damage, such difference may be submitted to the judgment and determination of arbitrators indifferently chosen, whose award in writing shall be conclusive and binding to all parties.
