NEW-YORK, SEPT. 30, 1868. Capt. Gold, from Porto Rico, informs, that news has reached there from the Main, that General Miranda, with 600 men, had landed in the Gulph of Coro and was immediately joined by 10,000 well disciplined men, and it was expected he would soon over-run the country. This news was received by a Danish schooner, and was believed. Capt. G. (who believes the news) says Miranda landed about the 25th of August. The news was received at Porto-Rico on the 8th of September. A letter from Porto-Rico, dated Sept. 8, says, "We learn that Lord Miranda has landed at Coro and that ten thousand of the inhabitants have joined him—if so, (says the letter) the Spaniards are dish-ed." [Our readers will compare this with the other Miranda-news, and make their own comment.] PEACE—The probability of this important event is strengthened from the circumstance of the news having been sent from Paris to Cadiz By EXPRESS. We have seen a letter of the 12th of August, from Cadiz, from one of the first houses there.—This letter says "Last Sunday the agreeable news of Peace between England, France, &c. reached us—signed at Paris on the 30th ult."

Mr. Fox—The following particulars of that distinguished statesman, are contained in an account of his situation, lately transmitted to senator Mitchell, from a most respectable source in London, dated July 26, 1868. I am persuaded that our best informed ministers are friendly to you. For peace and concord with you, will in unison, vibrate cordially here. You and we possess the trade of the world. I am sorry to add, the health of Mr. Fox, is in a low and dangerous state. With emaciation of the upper part of an originally firm trunk the lower extremities anasarous; and though it is proposed to prolong existence by scarifications, it will not restore the body. Add d to these d. optical affections, it is probable that a hydrops ptoicis, from a morbid liver, is disorganizing the functions of the noble parts. His death would certainly be a great loss at this time. I cannot, however, avoid fearing, he would be too precipitate in concluding a peace, when peace would only prove a dangerous truce."

We are informed by the capt of the ship Joseph, from New-Orleans, that in consequence of the intrusion of the Spaniard's crossing the Sabine, and the hostility evinced by their seizing upon an American post, a few miles from Natchitoches within an avowed determination of maintaining an encounter with our troops there; that Gov. Claiborne had sent on an express, which produced an order for the immediate levy of the militia, who in concert with the regulars, were ready, at a moment's notice, to march, and oblige them by force to recross the river. [A. Y. People's Friend]

WASHINGTON CITY, October 1. Extract of a letter from Major Claiborne, private secretary of Governor Claiborne, dated New-Orleans, August 29, 1868. "It is now within a few minutes of the time when letters must go to the post-office. I have waited to give you some information from Natchitoches, in case any should arrive; but no dispatches are received from governor Claiborne, nor do we hear any thing more of the governor of Texas and his nine hundred men. "The city of New-Orleans is in perfect tranquility; and the inhabitants thereof and of the country continue to enjoy entire good health. The summer has been mild, and the rains frequent and refreshing."

Extract of a letter from St. Stephens, Mississippi Territory, dated August 30. "The Spaniards have just passed an order, allowing us to navigate the Mobile river. But we are still, as I understand it, to pay twelve per centum on all exports, and on all our imports, and to go ten miles out of our way to Mobile, in order to do this. It was paid on provisions for the troops, just come over. And yet I know it will be trumpeted over the United States by persons residing in the Spanish dominions, that all difficulties are removed by Spain, and that we have now a free trade. We are happy in the belief that the government of the United States will make us befriended."

NORFOLK, September 24. This day came up to Hampton Roads, his Britannic majesty's frigate Amazon, one of the fleet under the command of sir John B. Warren, who is off our Capes with six sail of the line. Sir John having learnt at Newfoundland that the French fleet was on our coast, came in pursuit of it. In a late paper we stated, that sir Richard Strachan, in the Caesar, was on our coast—This was a mistake; he has not, with four other ships of the line of his fleet, been heard of since the gale. Arrived, sleep Director, Tarlington, 6 days from Bermuda. Left there the following ships of war: Veteran, Magicienne, Peateal and Indian. As the Director was coming out, a ship with an admiral's flag, red at the fore-top, was going in. On Monday last, in lat. 34, 34, long. 74, 40, spoke brig Franklin, of and bound to New-York, 17 days from Trinidad.

TO THE PEOPLE OF BALTIMORE. FELLOW-CITIZENS, Some time ago you were notified of elections to be made agreeably to law for representatives both in the city and state governments. But no intimation official or private has been publicly given, of the great object your city councils will have to decide on; I mean the amendments to the charter of incorporation. Three years ago upon the application of a number of citizens, the legislature passed an act to remedy several grievances that were painfully felt by most of the thinking people in Baltimore; leaving to the city councils an acceptance or rejection of the amendments after a new election. Such an united opposition was made by all the numbers and dependants on the present system; such a temper was worked up among a number of house owners, who now hold all the places in the council, and of course the power of taxation upon every inhabitant of the city, as well as the pleasure of riding all; that the act was rejected and every imperfection in the charter preserved to the great pleasure and profit of those who ruled above or under, as well as of all those who hate equal rights, and abhor the people's power. The inconveniences, however, were so sensibly felt, the defects so glaring, that the corporation with all the pride and injustice that prompted them to propose, the legislature should receive no petition for change in the charter without their approbation; were obliged, probably to prevent the people, to apply for alterations themselves. Thus they had it in their power to mention only what suited them: to abate a little where they could not help it, and give up nothing where they could. But instead of half redressing one grievance, they leaving untouched another, the assembly who perceived the inequality of the citizen's rights, and the long quiet oppression that might take place on a party, enacted several amendments to enlarge the privileges of the inhabitants both in electing and being elected; but wisely seeking to provide in season what might cost future struggles and dangerous strife otherwise to obtain. But from the same tenderness as before, left it to the city councils after a new election to receive or reject what was additional to their petition.

You have now that opportunity again presented to you, for the last time perhaps. The corporation men are assilent as death; and if you doze in forgetfulness they will never make the least noise to awaken you, till the electors are secured, and then they will reject in triumph whatever is most useful to you and most obnoxious to them.

In the mean time they are making as much stir and bustle about other elections as possible. This will keep your attention all turned another way, and prevent what they fear, your considering and sifting the affairs of the city. They have too the chance of distracting you and elbowing out some of your best friends from other quarters. Not a little busy are they in setting up new candidates, and exalting them with wonderful praise, while they endeavor to sink as low those who have hitherto enjoyed superior characters, and who I trust will never appear the worse of their handling.

My fellow-citizens, give not occasion to say of you as was said of the English by a French writer. They have freedom once in 7 years, and then have not the sense to make use of it. ANDREW MARVEL.
