

and his coadjutors here, will be deceived. This government is anxious to preserve peace and honest friendship with all nations. It will go far to do so. It may further suspend the non-impertation law: But there is a point beyond which it will not go. That point is, when Great Britain shall positively refuse to do us justice. Let her once put her absolute negative upon all our just propositions, and then she will find that we can endure privations and the worst calamities with patience and fortitude—that in the vindication of their rights, commercial and otherwise, Americans will display both valor and perseverance—and that if they are cautious in proceeding to extremities, it is only because they wish to arrive at honor through the Temple of Justice.

Extract of a letter from Liverpool, dated Feb. 7, 1867, received at New York.
"Your letter to us by Captain Grant, was the only one received per Dryad: the vessel having been boarded on the 20th ult. by a French privateer, the captain of which took away all the letters, returning only the owner's; the Dryad was also pillaged of her quadrants, some seamen's clothes, and other articles."

Extract of a letter from Havana, dated 15th ult.
"The last week the court sat for about seven hours in the case of the Columbian Packet: nothing decisive has been done, except as to the shipments of Messrs. Hargous, Hollingsworth and Son, and Bousquet, which were refused."

A decree will probably take place as to the rest at the next court, though from some remarks that fell from the Judge upon the deficiency of the evidence, I very much apprehend it will not be favorable.
"In the course of the trial, the Judge observed that where the right to the property rested principally upon letters from the claimant's correspondent, the originals, and not copies of such letters, ought to be produced."

"In the case of the Intrepid, Sater, the trial which took place the week preceding that of the Columbian Packet, further proof has been ordered, as the Judge thought there was reason to suspect that the outward cargo had been imported into the United States, from the colonies by the schooner and that there was a conspiracy of voyage from the colonies to the mother country."

"The Baltic, Donaldson, got in here a few days ago, after beating about the island upwards of a week.
"The brig Star, Marshall, from New York for Jamaica, and ship Calliope, from New York for Havana, were brought in here for trial, the latter however was liberated."

Extract of a letter from a Gentleman in Lexington (N. H.) to the Editor of the Enquirer, dated Feb. 15, 1867.
"You have no doubt received an account of Col. Burr's having surrendered himself up to the civil authority at Natchez. Col. B. and all universally detested in this country where the people are almost unanimous in their attachment to the union, and to the administration of Mr. Jefferson. They view with horror the idea of a separation from their Atlantic brethren. I think it a little probable, that Col. Burr to visit Lexington again, he might indulge of fiascos and balls, be treated to a coat of tar and feathers."

It is hinted in a popular French Journal, that the three Hanse Towns will have to pay a forced loan of 30,000,000 of francs, out of which Hamburg alone is to contribute 15 millions!

From Alicant, Jan. 6.—The Cyrus, Eames, from Boston, bound to Alicant, and schooner Amazon, Lincoln, were detained and carried into that place by a French cruiser, in consequence of Napoleon's Decree of November 21. The American Consul had commenced a suit, and was in hope to recover both. The schooner Belharis, Wild, from Boston, had arrived at Alicant, and sold his fish at 7 1/8 dols.

Letters received at New-York from Curacao, dated the 10th February, state that all American vessels in port at the time the island fell into the possession of the British, as well as all that have arrived since, are to undergo a regular trial. The cargoes are permitted to be sold at auction, and the proceeds are to be put into the hands of Commissioners until a later trial. The Brigs Patty, and St. Brides, were waiting for trial at the date of this letter.

From a Philadelphia Paper.
COMMUNICATION
We learn with pleasure, that Mr. BOWEN, proprietor of the Columbian Museum, at Boston, has experienced in a high degree the liberality of the opulent and most respectable citizens of New York and Philadelphia, in contributions towards rebuilding the edifice which was consumed by fire last January.

The captain of her took away the letter bag, returned only the owner's letters, and many other articles. He had captured a Scotch ship from this port bound to Virginia, the captain of which gave capt. Grant four letters, one of which is directed to Messrs. S. M'Dowal and Co. A few days before Captain Grant spoke the English frigate Acato, about 19 leagues off Cape Clear.
The George Washington, (a large American copper-bottomed ship) with the Officers, crew

and crew of the Valerense French frigate, captured at Philadelphia, was retained on board for the 15th ult. by the Blanch frigate, and arrived at Portsmouth.
The Sally, Gerdes, from America, for Dublin, put into this port on the 21st Jan. laid again on the 27th, and put back on the 11th inst.
The William and James, Tresler, hence for North Carolina, put into Kinsale the 22d ult. having carried away her main topmast, jib-boom, and lost a man overboard in a gale.
