

Foreign Intelligence.

Letter from the French Consul at Bucharest, to the Prince of Benevento, the Minister for Foreign Affairs.

Bucharest, Dec. 13. The Russian troops under Prince Dolgorouky, have arrested the Consul General Rheinhard, and the whole of his suite at Jassy. The details of this violent proceeding exhibit a conduct equally barbarous and unprecedented.

Mutlapha, Bayader is making great preparations. He fears that he will make use of all his power to oppose the Russians. One of his Officers, who commands at Bucharest, is occupied day and night in concerting measures for the public safety.

The Pacha of Ibrail is at the head of 25,000 men; with these he has formed a junction with Mutlapha Barayder. I am with respect, yours, &c.

LEDOULX.

POSEN, JAN. 22.

Two battalions of the 3d and 4th regiments of Polish Infantry of the line organized in this department, make the 17th int. for the eighth cohort of Brunberg (64 miles S. of Dantzic) — they were accompanied by the first regiment of Polish cavalry, and one battalion of the regiment of general prince Sulkowski, on their march from Guden.

The select corps of Marshal Oudinot amounts to 14,000 men, composed of grenadiers and riflemen. The 9th corps of the French army is under the command of prince Jerome, and occupies Silesia and the neighboring countries.

KONIGSBERG, JAN. 20.

The king having discovered their extreme partiality for the French, has dismissed his ministers and generals, whose imprudence was a cause of the late disasters. Haugwitz, Luchewski, and Kohler, are banished with disgrace, to their provinces.

The following Address has been circulated at the outposts of the French army.

Soldiers of France! France, when foreign armies meditated the conquest of your country, and came even in the bosom of your land to attack you, you repelled them with a valour and perseverance which the whole world admired. The report of your brilliant exploits reached even us. Your courage, your loyalty, was known to us, and the soldiers of France became the objects of our esteem. But it is no longer your country which demands your efforts.

PENNINGSEN.

NEW YORK, April 20.

Yesterday was a very great day of arrivals—nearly 60 full valuable vessels—came in—and many more before last night, with a fine breeze from the southward.

From London.

The ship Gold Hunter, captain Vofe, in 27 days passage, we have received London papers and Lloyd's list to the evening of the 20th of March. They contain nothing later from the armies in Poland. They state that the Russian army, under the command of Gen. Michelson, was marching from Constantinople, and is already at Georgia, beyond Widdin, where it engaged a Turkish corps, and killed 8000 men, but it sustained itself a loss of 3000. The Turks preparing for war with as much activity and vigour as a weak government is capable of—but long before the preparations are completed the Russians will have over-run the empire, and have fixed their standards on the walls of Constantinople.

The papers also state a change in the English administration. On this subject the Courier of the 20th March says: "On Wednesday, before his majesty left town, a message was transmitted to Lords Eldon and Hawkebury, commanding their attendance at Windsor yesterday morning. Their lordships attended his majesty, and upon their return they waited upon the Duke of Portland, who with the before-mentioned lords, and lords Lowther and Melville were to frame a New Administration. As soon as a list of the new ministry has been prepared, it will be laid before his majesty, but the arrangements are not expected to be completed before the end of next week—His majesty will then cause it to be intimated to the present ministers, that he has no occasion for their further services—for they give out openly that they are determined not to resign—but to remain in till they are turned out. The king having consented to a partial indulgence to Catholics by extending the Irish act of 1793 to Great Britain, ministers made use of this consent to surprise the king's confidence into a total repeal of the Test Laws; as far as the army and navy are concerned. Papists were to be our generals on the staff; our ministers-general of the ordinance; our commanders in chief; the captains and admirals of our fleets; in short they were to be trampled with the full power of the sword. His majesty having gained information of this attempt to swindle his consent to a repeal of the test laws, expressed his displeasure and his determination to resist this dishonest attack upon his confidence.—Ministers being thus detected and exposed, propose to his majesty the retraction of their measure, to which his majesty, with the utmost condescension and forgiveness, consents, provided they will agree not to force the measure upon him again, or make a second attempt to surprize his confidence. To this stipulation ministers refuse to consent, and acquaint the public they have taken their line; they shall not resign,—his majesty may turn them out if he pleases.

The charge, therefore, which some supposed would be partial, keeping in the Sidmouths, who are known to be adverse to the catholic question, and even the Prince's friends, will be complete. The Sidmouths will go out as well as the Grenvilles and the Foxites. FOREIGN NEWS.

Yesterday afternoon arrived, ship Sally, Capt. Hallings, from Rotterdam.—By this vessel we have received a regular file of the Leyden Journal, (printed in the French language) to the 11th March, from which the following articles are extracted. It will be remembered that this Journal is under the immediate control of Bonaparte.

[Translations for the Philadelphia Gazette.] Warsaw, Feb. 15.—The city of War was illuminated yesterday in rejoicings of the victory obtained at Eylau, on the 8th inst. by the grand army. The extent of that success is confirmed every moment, by the numerous convoys of Russian prisoners that are passing incessantly by our walls. On the other hand, the French army has to regret many brave men at whose loss the emperor has expressed the deepest regret. Marshal Augereau was wounded in his arm, but not dangerously. Marshal Massena has been these few days in this city. The equipages and horses of the Emperor, that had remained here, are gone towards Thion.

The thaw that began on the 10th, did not last. Since the 12th the air has become very brisk and we have now beautiful weather.

Berlin, Feb. 28.—Letters from the grand army, anxiously waited for, give us interesting details of the consequences of the battle of Eylau. It has left the French entirely masters of the field of battle, precipitately abandoned by the Russians, who have retreated beyond the Pregel, which they have crossed again.

The French, on the contrary, have advanced partly towards the borders of that river. The grand duke of Berg had on the 17th inst. his headquarters at Witttemberg, and his patrols had pushed them near Konigsberg. At the same time the headquarters of the emperor Napoleon, were still at Prussian Eylau. However in consequence of a proclamation of his I. M. the greater part of his troops will draw nearer the Vistula, and enter again into quarters. The headquarters has indeed fallen back on the 20th, as far as Liebhadt, from which place it was believed in yere to be removed further back, to Osterode. In the mean while, there has been another smart engagement between two divisions of the armies. The 5th corps of the grand army, and that of general Essen came to blows, on the 16th, near Oitrowenka.

The French, headed by general Savary, in the absence of marshal Lannes, have again obtained great advantage over the Russians. This same fortune has remained also faithful to the troops of the former in the two engagements which they have fought against the Prussians on the right bank of the Oder, at Starigard and at Nengenau.

Breslau, Feb. 18.—It was yesterday announced on the parade, that conformably to the capitulation of Schweidnitz of the 7th inst. the garrison of that fortress having received no succours up to the 10th, marched out on that day, at 10 o'clock, and laid down their arms, before Prince Jerome Napoleon. His Imperial Highness has ordered the Wirtemberg troops to file off before him, and at their head has entered the evacuated fortress. The day before, a Prussian corps of 200 horse, and 1600 infantry, had endeavored, by Glatz, to penetrate through the passes of the mountains, with the intention, no doubt, to try to succour Schweidnitz; but general Lefebvre, who had been ordered to attack that corps, got the start of it, put it to rout, and took 200 prisoners, and 2 cannon.

Memel, Feb. 3.—The Prussian Majesties have retired from Konigsberg, and arrived here with their court. The king has permitted major Pfuhl, one of his confidential officers, to enter into the Russian service. The van-guard of the Russian forces, opposed to the grand French army, is now commanded by prince Bagration, who has distinguished himself by his courage in the last war.

M. de Cefar has been nominated by our king, ambassador of Prussia to the court of Denmark.

Extract of a letter from Bermuda, dated the 9th inst. "The ship Titus, and part of her cargo has been condemned—as also, the ship Cicero, vessel and cargo; the Baltic and Apollo, both is said will be condemned; in fact since they have received the account that the American treaty with England is not favourably received, it has had great effect with the judge, and indeed he condemns almost every thing that is worth having; it tends in all they can find; there is two vessels sent here outward bound, one from N. Y. and one from Alexandria; there is here fourteen fail of American vessels detained and condemned."
