

Mr. Kell delivers a memorial from the justices of the levy court of Baltimore county, praying for a law confirming the several levies or assessments heretofore made by the levy court of said county, and also praying for a new assessment for the city and county of Baltimore; which was read and referred to Messrs. Kell, Price and Johnson.

The bill authorising certain alterations in Baltimore county and city court rooms, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follows:

So it was resolved in the affirmative and the bill sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to authorise Thomas Pearson, late collector of Caroline county, to complete his collections; the bill to allow William Waller, late sheriff and collector of Somerset county, further time to complete his collection; the bill authorising and empowering the levy court of Saint Mary's county to assess and levy a sum of money for the support and maintenance of Ann Tippet and Ann Tyser; the bill to allow further time to the securities of Thomas Thompson, late collector of Dorchester county, to complete their collection; the bill to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council for the ensuing year, and the bill to prevent swine and geese from going at large in the town of Hancock Washington county, severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill for the relief of William Dougherty of Frederick county. On motion by Mr. Wilson, the following words were inserted at the end of the bill: "And provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to give the said court any power, except to relieve the person of said William Dougherty from confinement."

The bill having been read throughout as amended, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of Priscilla Nicholls of Montgomery county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Whitely from the committee delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of John Hutson of Caroline county, a revolutionary soldier, beg leave to report, that they have had the same under consideration, and find the facts therein stated to be true; they therefore submit the following resolution:

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby directed to pay to John Hutson, of Caroline county, late a soldier in the revolutionary war, or to his order, annually, in quarterly payments, during his life, a sum of money equal to the half pay of a private, as an additional compensation to him for those services by which his country has been so essentially benefitted.
