Mr. Stansbury from the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, delivers resolutions in favour of Margaret Hamilton, Zachariah Roberts, John Smith, Sarah Smith, and James Barnes; which were severally read and assented to.

On motion by Mr. Pratt, the following order was read:

Ordered, That a committee be appointed by this house, in conjunction with a committee from the senate, to enquire of the mayor and council of the city of Baltimore, whether they would furnish all necessary buildings for the seat of government.

Mr. Cosden moved that it lie on the table? Determined in the negative.

On the second reading thereof, Mr. Pratt moved to withdraw the same. Resolved in the affirmative.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to prevent the erection of booths within two miles of any Methodist camp or quarterly meeting, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendment was read the second time, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

And the resolution in favour of Gibert Middleton, endorsed "assented to."

The bill for the relief of Adelaide V. Lowe, of Frederick county, was read the second time and passed.

Mr. Howard delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Charles Carroll, of Carrolton, and others, of Anne-Arundel county, praying for a road in said county, beg leave respectively to report, that they have taken the same into consideration, and are of opinion, that inasmuch as there is already ample provisions made by law for the case, that the prayer of the petitioners ought not to be granted.

Mr. Edelen reports a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the county clerks of this state to judge and approve of security in cases therein mentioned. Mr. Thomas reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of the Westminster, Taney town and Emmitsburgh turnpike company. Also a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Dennis Sollers, and Prescilla Sollers, his wife; and Mr. Howard reports a bill, entitled An act allowing to Mary Wood, widow of John Wood, of Anne Arundel county, a right of dower in and to the land therein mentioned; which were read.

The order relative to granting leaves, after this day, was read the second time, on motion by Mr. Farquhar, the same was referred to the 1st June.

Mr. Farquhar delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county praying that the road from Frederick to Emmitsburg might be opened and straightened, report, that they have taken the same into consideration, and after mature deliberation are of opinion, that the prayer ought not to be granted. After many years experience, the legislature having found, that in the exercise of their power to alter and straighten public roads, great injustice and inconvenience had arisen, gave all necessary jurisdiction to the respective levy courts to administer justice on the subject of this petition. The committee would therefore recommend that the petitioners have leave to withdraw their petition.
