The clerk of the senate returns the bill to divorce Eve Feezer, the bill for the relief of Charlotte Schwartz, severally endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendments were severally read, assented to, and the bills ordered to be engrossed.

Also the bill for the relief of Ann Margaret Beatty, the bill to provide for the more comfortable maintenance of sick persons confined in the several jails of this state, and the bill for the relief of Nancy Visage, severally endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

Also a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of James Mobly, and wife, of Prince-George's county, endorsed "will pass;" which was read.

Also the resolutions in favour of John K. B. Emory, and Peter Joy, and the resolution relative to the executive employing counsel in the case of the administrator of Louisa Browning, severally endorsed "assented to."

On motion by Mr. Teackle the following resolution was read:

Whereas, the highest concernsments of these states, not only as they regard their exterior policy, and foreign commerce, but the immediate interests of their agriculture and domestic industry, are deeply involved in the proper adjustment and preservation of political relations with the Republics of Colombia, of Mexico and of Central America: And whereas, the said republics have deputed plenipotentiaries to constitute a congress to be assembled at the Isthmus of Panama, to deliberate upon matters deemed important to their common welfare; And whereas an invitation to attend at those deliberations, and to take a part in them, has been accepted by the President of the United States, "so far as may be compatible with that neutrality, from which it is neither our intention, nor the desire of the other American states, that we should depart;" therefore,

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That we highly approve of the course pursued by the President of the United States, in relation to the congress to be assembled at the Isthmus of Panama, as contained in his message to both houses of congress at the commencement of the present session.

And be it further resolved, That his excellency the governor be requested to communicate the foregoing preamble and resolution to the Senators and Representatives of this state in the Congress of the United States.
