On motion the question was put, will the senate reconsider the resolutions in favor of the officers and soldiers of the revolution. Determined in the negative.

The resolution in favor of Augusta Deany, was read the second time by special order, dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favor of the clerks of the senate and of the house of delegates, was read the second time, assented to and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution relative to the additional compensation allowed to clerks and other officers for extraordinary services, was read the second time, assented to and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have dissented from the first amendment proposed by your honorable house to the resolutions relative to the resolutions proposing to alter the constitution of the United States, by reducing the term of service of the senators of the United States from six to four years, and have assented to the
