

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

On motion of Mr. Harper, Ordered, That the same have a third reading on Monday the 31st instant. The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act respecting the herding of cattle in Allegany county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill relating to the Union Bank of Maryland, was read the second time and laid on the table. On motion of Mr. Harper, the said bill was referred to a special committee. Ordered, That Messrs. Harper, Howard and Carmichael, be the said committee.

The bill authorising and directing the levy court of Washington county to levy and assess a sum of money for the support of a foundling child, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass.

The bill for the relief of Andrew Raburgh of Queen-Anne's county; the bill for the relief of Richard Odle of Anne-Arundel county; the bill for the benefit of Ann Hows of Prince-George's county; the bill for the relief of Rosanna Scott of Harford county; the bill for the benefit of Mary Franklin of Charles county; the bill for the relief of William Aeton and Richard Bateman of Charles county; the bill for the relief of William Morgan, his wife, and two children, of Caroline county; the bill for the benefit of Henry Straughan, an insane child of Priscilla Straughan, of Caroline county; the bill supplementary to an act, entitled, An act for the support of Evan Price; the bill for the benefit of Sarah Richards of Montgomery county; the bill for the benefit of Joseph Robertson of Calvert county; the bill for the relief of Sarah Neale of Saint-Mary's county; the bill authorising and empowering the levy court of Saint-Mary's county to assess and levy a sum of money for the support and maintenance of Catharine Brewer of said county; the bill authorising and empowering the levy court of Saint-Mary's county to assess and levy a sum of money for the support and maintenance of Ann Tippett of said county; the bill for the relief of Mary Dean of Saint-Mary's county; the bill for the relief of Ann Branson and Ally Buckler of Saint-Mary's county; the bill for the benefit of Elizabeth Dery of Saint-Mary's county; the bill for the benefit of Samuel Alexander, orphan son of William Alexander, of Saint-Mary's county; the bill for the benefit of John W. S. Boyer of Kent county; the bill for the benefit of Joseph Leary, and Julia Leary his daughter, of Kent County; the bill for the benefit of John Cowander of Kent county; and the bill for the support of John Evely of Montgomery county; were read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.

The senate resumed the consideration of the bill for the relief of Richard Dove, and Eleanor his wife, of Anne-Arundel county; the bill was then read, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Howard from the committee reported a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act for the benefit of the University of Maryland; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion of Mr. Howard, Ordered, That the said bill have a second reading on Monday the 31st instant.

Mr. Harper from the committee to whom was referred the bill relating to the Union Bank of Maryland, reported the same without amendment.

On motion of Mr. Harper, Ordered, That the said bill have a third reading on Monday the 31st inst.

On motion of Mr. West, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry poor persons in the several counties therein mentioned. Ordered, That Messrs. West, Gale and Jackson, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. West from the committee reported the said bill; which was read the first, and by special order the second time, and will pass.

On motion of Mr. Harper, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act relating to the voting by proxies in the several banks in this state. Ordered, That Messrs. Harper, Hollyday and Carmichael, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The senate proceeded to the reconsideration of the bill authorising William Robinson to remove his negroes from the state of Virginia into this state; the bill being read, the question was put, Shall this bill pass? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Gale from the committee reported the bill further to continue an act passed at November session 1795, entitled, An act to incorporate an insurance company in Baltimore town, with sundry amendments.

On motion of Mr. Gale, the question was put, Will the senate receive the following as amendments to said bill? Amendments proposed. 1st. Strike out "1840" 8th line enacting clause and insert "eighteen hundred and thirty-seven." 2d. After the word "thereafter" 9th line enacting clause insert "unless the same shall before that time be repealed by law, provided that no such repeal shall go to affect any policy that may be made, or any contract already in existence at the time of said repeal" 3rd. At the end of the bill add the following section: "And be it enacted, That nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the legislature of this state from hereafter imposing a tax on said institution, not exceeding twenty cents per annum in each hundred dollars of their actual capital, if the legislature shall deem it expedient so to do." Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill was then read a third time as amended, and the question put, Shall the said bill as amended pass? Determined in the affirmative.

Mr. Gale from the committee reported the bill to continue an act passed at November session one thousand eight hundred and four, entitled, An act to incorporate the Chesapeake Insurance Company, with sundry amendments.

The bill was read a second time, and on motion of Mr. Gale, the question was put, Will the senate receive the following as amendments to said bill? Amendments proposed. 1st. Strike out the word "forty" 5th line 1st section and insert "thirty-six." 2d. After the word "thereafter" last line same section insert "unless the same shall before that time be repealed by law, provided that no such repeal shall go to affect any policy that may be made, or any contract already in existence at the time of said repeal." 3rd. At the end of the bill add "not exceeding twenty cents per annum in each hundred dollars of their actual capital, if the legislature should deem it expedient so to do." Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill was then read a third time by special order, as amended, and the question put, Shall the said bill as amended pass? Determined in the affirmative.
