

The further supplement to an act to incorporate a company for erecting a bridge over Chester river, at Chester town, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The bill to prevent swine from going at large in Union town, of Frederick county, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The bill to authorise the president and directors of the Conococheague bank to sell or otherwise dispose of the interest of the bank in the Cumberland road stock, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for regulating the mode of staying executions, and repealing the acts of assembly therein mentioned, and for other purposes, was read the third time as amended, and the question put, Shall the said bill as amended pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

The bill relating to the Surgical Institution of Baltimore, was read the third time and will pass.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to pay the civil list and other expenses of civil government; a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to regulate lotteries; a bill, entitled, An act to repeal so much of the act to regulate lotteries as provides for the appointment of lottery commissioners and their clerk; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Margaret Danskin of the city of Baltimore; And the following resolutions:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, February 5, 1820.

Resolved by the general assembly of Maryland, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is authorised, to pay the whole principal and interest of the bank loans of 1817 and 1818, reimbursable in 1820, in the event of the treasury receiving from the general government on the balance of the states' claims the sum of \$314,000 during the current year, otherwise to discharge one half of the principal and interest of said loans to such of the several banks to whom the same is due, as the governor and council shall direct.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, February 7, 1820.

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore of Maryland be and he is hereby authorised and directed, to pay to Edward Ridgely, administrator de bonis non of the personal estate of John Ridgely, late of Baltimore county, deceased, or to his order, the sum of forty-seven pounds, three shillings and six pence, according to the resolves passed at November session seventeen hundred and ninety-seven and ninety-eight, being the amount heretofore deposited in the treasury of the western shore by Benjamin Nicholson, executor of the said John Ridgely, for the payment of a British debt due to a certain James Russell, provided the said Edward Ridgely give bond, to be approved of by the said treasurer, to refund the aforesaid sum of money in case a certificate should at any time be produced to the treasurer, acknowledging that on the twenty-ninth day of June seventeen hundred and eighty-one, Benjamin Nicholson, executor of John Ridgely, paid to the treasurer for James Russell, the sum of forty-seven pounds, three shillings and two pence, by virtue of an act passed at November session seventeen hundred and eighty, entitled, An act for calling out of circulation the quota of the state bills of credit emitted by acts of assembly under the old government, and by the resolves of the convention.

Which were read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Howard from the committee reported a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Baltimore Society for the encouragement of Industry; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The president laid before the senate a communication from the executive, enclosing the report of the general assembly of the state of Ohio, relative to an amendment to the constitution of the United States, proposed by the state of Pennsylvania; which was read and ordered to be printed.

The further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein named, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The bill providing for the valuation of the real and personal property in Charles and Dorchester counties, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass with the proposed amendment. Amendment proposed. 1st line enacting clause, after the word "enacted," insert the words "by the general assembly of Maryland."

The bill to authorise the judges of the first judicial district to convey the lands therein mentioned, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass.

The bill respecting certain suits or actions wherein judgements may be reversed, and writs of procedendo awarded, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The senate resumed the consideration of the bill authorising a lottery or lotteries for the purpose of finishing the Susquehanna bridge now building at the Conowingo Falls; the same being read, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:
