

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

An act to authorize John Aydolette, of Worcester county, to bring into the state of Maryland his negro slave named Parker; the bill entitled, An act for the relief of James Williams, the younger, of Caroline county, and the bill entitled, An additional supplement to the act entitled, an act to erect a new market house in Hager's-town, in Washington county, were sent to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. M'Kim, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act relative to the road made by the United States from Cumberland on the Potomac river, to or near Wheeling on the Ohio river. Ordered, that Messrs. M'Kim, Wootton and Miller bring in the same.

On motion the bill entitled, An act to settle and ascertain the salary of the council for the ensuing year being the order of the day for to-day, was postponed until to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Johnson, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act to regulate the removal of civil and criminal cases from one county to another. Ordered, that Messrs. Johnson, M'Kim and Quinton bring in the same.

On motion of Mr. Wootton, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act authorizing commissioners to make alterations in the election districts of Montgomery county. Ordered, that Messrs. Wootton, Bowie and Dickinson bring in the same.

Mr. M'Kim from the committee, reports a bill entitled, An act relative to the road from Cumberland, on the Potomac river, to or near Wheeling on the Ohio river; which was read the first, and by special order the second and third time, and will pass.

Mr. Johnson asked and obtained leave of absence for Mr. M'Kim until Thursday the 27th inst.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:—

RESOLVED, That the senate will proceed to the election of a director for the state in the bank of Baltimore on Wednesday the 8th of January next.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 20, 1821.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. Mr. Chambers appeared in the senate. Mr. Price appeared, qualified and took his seat.

The bill entitled, An act to provide for the inspection of ground black oak bark, was read the third time, amended, and will pass.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill for the relief of Edward Rider, of Baltimore county; which was read the first, and by special order the second and third time, and will pass. Also, a resolution relative to appointing a committee to inspect the penitentiary, and a resolution in favor of the clerk of Anne Arundel county; which were read the first time and laid on the table.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act to alter the time of meeting of the general assembly of this state, and for other purposes. Ordered, that Messrs. Orrell, Miller and Cockey bring in the same.

The bill entitled, An act providing for the appointment of an attorney general, was read the second time and laid on the table. On motion the said bill was made the order of the day for to-morrow.

The bill entitled, An act for the relief of Benedict and Alexis Boone, was read the third time and postponed until the first day of January next.

The bill entitled, An act for the benefit of George A. Dunkel, of the city of Baltimore, was read the third time, and postponed until the first day of January next.

The bill for the support of Susanna Kinggold, of Kent county, was read the second time and laid on the table.

The bill relative to the road made by the United States from Cumberland, on the Potomac river, to or near Wheeling, on the Ohio river. The bill to provide for the inspection of ground black oak bark, and the bill for the relief of Edward Rider, were sent to the house of delegates.

On motion the bill for the relief of the poor of Anne Arundel county, was referred to Messrs. Bowie, Wootton and Dickinson.

On motion, the resolution appointing a committee to inspect the penitentiary, was read by special order the second and third time, and assented to.

The bill to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council for the ensuing year, being the order of the day, was taken up, read a third time, and will not pass.

On motion the following message was read and adopted:

BY THE SENATE, December 20, 1821.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates—The senate in the execution of their constitutional province, have been called on to consider the bill passed in your body to settle and ascertain the salaries of the members of the council for the ensuing year. The senate have no authority to amend or alter the bill, and on reference to the remuneration given to other salary officers, they cannot believe there is any propriety in reducing the sum heretofore allowed to the members of the council. They therefore return the bill, in the hope that a re-consideration of the subject in your body will result in a conviction that the views of the senate in declining to reduce the compensation to members of the council ought to be adopted. The clerk of the house of delegates returns the bill supplementary to the act entitled, "An act to incorporate a company for erecting a bridge over Chester river at Chestertown, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. And delivers a bill for appointing a printer to the state; which was read the first time and laid on the table.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.
