

incorporate the Stockholders of the Marine Bank of Baltimore; which was read a first time and laid on the table.

Mr Johnson presented the Memorial of the representatives of the yearly meeting of the society of friends in the City of Baltimore, counter to the petition of a number of friends residing in the eastern part of said City, which was read and referred to the same committee to whom was referred the last mentioned petition. On motion the said committee was enlarged to five and Messrs Chambers and Dickinson added to it.

Mr Johnson presented the petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore, praying the alteration of the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in said City and for other purposes; which was read and referred to Messrs Johnson, M'Kim and Quinton.

The clerk of the Council delivered a communication from the executive, recommending the providing by resolution or otherwise an adequate remuneration to Henry M. Murray, esq. for services rendered the state in the argument of certain criminal cases in the court of Appeals; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled, A further additional supplement to an act to regulate the inspection of fish; which was read the first and by special order a second time, and referred to Messrs Johnson, Miller and Wootton, and returns the bill relating to the University of Maryland, with the amendment proposed by the committee of conference; which bill with the amendments were read the first and by special order a second and third time, and on motion the question was put, shall the bill pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

AFFIRMATIVE.—Messrs President, Chambers, Claude, Dickinson, Johnson, Miller, and Wootton—7

NEGATIVE.—Messrs. Cockey, Kent, and Orrell.—3. Determined in the affirmative. Mr. Quinton declined dividing and Mr M'Kim was excused from voting, having made an offer for the stock proposed to be raised by the bill.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following message:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, Jan. 24, 1822.

Gentlemen of the Senate—This house having passed a bill supplementary to the act entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of tobacco, and your house having also passed a bill with a similar title, and as the provisions of the two bills are contradictory, this house ask a conference on the above bills. If you should deem it expedient to accede to this proposition, this house appoint Messrs Dorsey, Barney, J. Forrest, Bruce and A. Spence to confer with such members as you shall appoint.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 25, 1822.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The communication from the executive recommending a compensation to Henry M. Murray for professional services rendered the state; and the bill relating to the University of Maryland, were sent to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of Sarah Middleton, was read a second time, and referred to Messrs. Chambers, Johnson, Kent, Quinton and Brownley.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates.

BY THE SENATE, January 25, 1822.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates—We accede to your proposal for a conference on the tobacco bills now under consideration in both houses, and have appointed on the part of the senate, Messrs. M'Kim, Wootton and Bowie, to confer with the members appointed by your house.

The resolution to compensate the commissioners for examining the turnpike road, was read a third time, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill authorizing the court of Harford county to adjudge to be laid out and opened certain roads, was read a third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to prevent swine and geese from going at large in the village of Friendship, in Anne Arundel county; the bill for the benefit of captain James Mitchell, of Cecil county; the bill to enable the commissioners of the town of Havre de-Grace to hold a lot of ground, and the improvements therein mentioned; the bill relating to the opening of Bottle-alley in the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes, were severally read a third time, passed, and sent to house of delegates.

The bill to incorporate the president and commissioners of the town of Elkton, and declare their powers; and the bill for the benefit of the stockholders of the Susquehannah bridge, were read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from Boonsborough to Hager's town, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks in the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes, was on motion read a third time, and will pass with the proposed amendments. Amendments proposed—After the word 'enacted' in the first line, seventh section, strike out the word 'pay.' In the seventh line, same section, and insert 'That on the first day of January 1836, and on the first day of January annually thereafter, the president, directors and company of the aforesaid banks shall.' Sent to the house of delegates.

The additional supplement to the act to regulate the inspection of lumber in the city and county of Baltimore, was read a second time and referred to Messrs. M'Kim, Quinton and Brownley.
