

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1822.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolution in favor of Elizabeth Isabel; the resolution in favor of Joseph Thomas; the supplement to an act entitled, An act to provide for the erection of an additional wharf in the town of Nottingham, in Prince George's county, and for other purposes; and the bill for building a bridge over Tuckahoe creek, where the old bridge now stands, were sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. M. Kim moved to reconsider the bill entitled, A further supplement to the act to regulate lotteries, and the question was put and determined in the affirmative; and on motion of Mr. M. Kim the bill was recommitted to Messrs. M. Kim, Dickinson and Brownley.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following message:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, Feb. 20, 1822.

*Gentlemen of the Senate*—We propose with the concurrence of your honorable body to proceed on to-morrow at 12 o'clock to the election of directors on the part of the state for the Union Bank of Maryland, the Mechanics' Bank of Baltimore, the Commercial and Farmers' Bank of Baltimore, the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, at Annapolis, the branch of the Farmers' Bank of Maryland at Easton, the Hager's-town Bank, and the Elkton Bank of Maryland; the following gentlemen are put in nomination on the part of this house. For directors for the Union Bank of Maryland, Messrs. William Pinkney, junior, and William Stansbury. For the Mechanics' Bank of Baltimore, Messrs. Tobias E. Stansbury and William Stuart. For the Commercial and Farmers' Bank of Baltimore, Messrs. Upton Bruce and John Barney. For the Farmers' Bank of Maryland at Annapolis, Messrs. Nicholas Brewer and John Johnson. For the branch of the Farmers' Bank of Maryland at Easton, Messrs. Lambert Reardon and William Clark. For the Hager's town Bank, Messrs. John Buchanan and Daniel Schnebly; and for the Elkton Bank of Maryland, Mr. George Beaston; and Messrs. Loockerman and Millard are appointed by this house to join such gentlemen as may be named by you to count the ballots and report thereon.

Also a resolution in favor of William Sewell; a resolution in favor of Anthony Davis; which were severally read the first, and by special order a second time and referred to Messrs. Johnson, Kent and Brownley. And returns the bill concerning the judgments of justices of the peace, endorsed 'will not pass.' Also the bill relating to minors, and the bill concerning the chancery court, endorsed 'will pass.' And delivered a bill entitled, An act for the relief of colonel Roger Jones, Gracey Ann Blackwell and Catharine Monmouth; which was read the first, and by special order a second time, and referred to Messrs. Claude, Orrell and Dickinson. And returns the bill to give validity and operation to the deed of conveyance therein mentioned.

The bill to repeal all that part of the constitution and form of government as relates to the division of Dorchester county into five separate election districts, was read the second, and by special order a third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to alter the time of holding the county court in Somerset county, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to incorporate the trustees of the Chesapeake Academy, was read a second time and laid on the table.

Mr. Johnson offered the following message, which was read, adopted, and sent to the house of delegates.

BY THE SENATE, Feb. 21, 1822.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates*—The senate will proceed to-day to the election of directors for the several banks mentioned in your message of yesterday at the hour proposed by your honorable body. No other persons are nominated by the senate than those named by your house.

Messrs. Johnson and Dickinson are appointed by the senate to join the gentlemen named by your house to count the ballots.

The supplement to the act to prohibit sheriffs from receiving negro slaves into the public jails of this state, except by due course of law; was read a second time and laid on the table.

Mr. Claude from the committee to whom was referred the bill for the relief of colonel Roger Jones, Gracey Ann Blackwell and Catherine Monmouth, reported the same without amendment, and the bill was read a third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Bowie from the committee to whom was referred the bill authorizing the appointment of an agent reported that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that the bill ought to pass; which report was concurred in. The bill was then read a third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. M. Kim presented the following report:

The select committee to whom was referred a bill entitled, A further supplement to the act to regulate lotteries, beg leave to report that they have had the same under consideration, and they recommend to the senate that the said bill should pass in the original form it was received from the house of delegates, and that the senate do reject the amendments made by them to the said bill.

Which was read and concurred in.
