M O N D A Y, January 13, 1783.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Forrest appeared in the house.

The bill relating to certain purchases of confiscated property, was sent to the senate by Mr. Taylor and Mr. Duvall.

Mr. Hindman, from the committee of claims, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the journal of accounts and list of debts; which was read and assented to, and sent to the senate by Mr. Hindman and Mr. Sewell.

Mr. Hindman, from the committee of claims, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act for the payment of the journal of accounts; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion by Mr. Chase seconded by Mr. Forrest, **RESOLVED**, That all collectors in arrears to the public for the assessment or tax, or any public monies, in the years 1779, 1780, and 1781, be immediately sued.

The amendments to the bill for the more effectual collection of fines and forfeitures, were read the second time and rejected.

The bill to continue the acts of assembly therein mentioned, was read the second time and passed. Sent to the senate by Mr. Brogden and Mr. Griffith.

The report on the proceedings of the commissioners for the preservation and sale of confiscated British property, was read the second time and ordered to lie on the table.

Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to appoint an intendant of the revenue, endorsed; "By the senate, January 13, 1783: " Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
