Four students and one teacher will represent Kent County at the third annual Maryland Junior Science and Humanities Symposium April 1-3 in Baltimore's Lord Baltimore Hotel.

The symposium, administered by the Maryland Academy of Sciences, will bring to Baltimore more than 250 students and teacher delegates from high schools throughout the State for the three-day program of lectures, informal discussions, demonstrations, tours and social activities.

It is intended to provide advanced study for students interested in scientific careers. A number of nationally prominent scientists and educators will present papers to the young scientists. While at the symposium, the students and teachers will have opportunities to talk informally with the scientists in small groups and visit research laboratories in the Baltimore-Washington area.
