POPULISM. The Populist party convention for the Fifth congressional district of Maryland met on the 25th ult. in Washington, D. C., and nominated Mr. E. M. Burchard, of Hyattsville, for the long term in Congress and Mr. Samuel C. Heird, of Catonsville, for the short term.

Among other things promulgated, voicing the sentiments of the convention, was: "We demand and propose to secure such radical changes in existing conditions that the poorest man, who is willing to work, may earn \$2 a day and have unlimited employment."

The serious, well-versed political economist of the day will fail to see the "wisdom" of attempting to create permanent prosperity in this way. It is about on a par with the small boy who asked his father for money and on being refused on the ground that money was so scarce told his father to go to the bank, he would find plenty of it there!

Contemplating the outcome of such a policy the end is not rosy. The ignominious of an inflated currency has been during some years on in this country for many years past. Money, plenty of it! is the cry, regardless of consequences and regardless of the experiences we have passed through.

Doubtless our financial system as far as helping the masses is concerned is defective. But it is not defective on account of the lack of money. Money is neither true assets nor the basis of wealth. No country can hope for prosperity unless there is a strict obedience to the law of supply and demand.

Great minds in the Democratic party—notably Mr. Cleveland—for years have been endeavoring to reach the obtainable. That is, secure a policy for the nation that will best equalize the rights between those whose genius and energy is calculated to win for them large fortunes and those seeking a simple competency. A cardinal idea of Democratic policy is to throw wide open the doors to every man seeking betterment.

We would suggest to our Populist friends that they first strive to keep the Democratic party in power as the next best thing they can do if they have seen that Republican policy has been bad for the country. Never has there been a stage in the history of our country when firmness and clearheadedness have been so requisite as now.

The whole tendency of Populism is toward socialism in a high degree and the Democrat who hopes to see a realization of his cherished ideas as to what constitute the most suitable laws for a people like ours will be wretchedly disappointed if he concludes to join the Populist party.

There never was a more equal distribution of wealth than in the decade previous to 1850, under a tariff wisely and patriotically imposed by the Democrats. Every true Democrat is ardent in his desire for a resumption of that policy.

MR. GORMAN. The prevalent thought among many Democrats is, because the Senate is wrong on the tariff question, Mr. Gorman is responsible for it. Mr. Gorman is charged with being a Protectionist, an impeachment not easily sustained.

He chose to do differently. While uncompromising Democrats were justly demanding that the pledges of the party be carried out, Mr. Gorman, having viewed the situation said: "It can't be done at this time. You are asking me to accomplish what I consider an impossibility. There are too many phases to this question at this time for any man or set of men to accomplish what you want."

Such may be ascribed as some of the reasons for Mr. Gorman's recent speech in the Senate. Socrates was condemned to death because his views were at variance with the prevailing ideas of the Athenians, but many of the latter lived to discover that the philosopher was right. Mr. Gorman may be right or wrong, but we believe he will be able to demonstrate that he did what he thought, was best under the circumstances.

We don't think Mr. Gorman ought to be consigned to Gehenna at this time. Wait until he crosses the dead line. There is not necessarily a conflict between Mr. Gorman and Mr. Cleveland; only a difference of opinion. The Baltimore Sun has endeavored to magnify this difference into an irreconcilable breach.

Mr. Snodgrass, of Tennessee, is authority for saying, Thursday, that Senator Gorman when consulted by the conferees a few days since for any suggestion that might improve the situation told them that hereafter he would be responsible only for his own vote.

While it is an outrage that a Democratic tariff bill has not been passed here can we justly lay the blame on Mr. Gorman? As regards reaching an agreement on the tariff question the signs are more hopeful. Rumors, based on what is believed to be positive knowledge, are afloat to the effect that the Senate conferees are less firm in their position than they were and are showing a disposition to make such concessions as will be accepted by the House.

CHINA AND JAPAN. Late advices from the east indicate that China and Japan are about to engage in the throes of a deadly struggle for the possession of or certain rights in Corea hitherto a dependency of China.

THE BATTLE OF YOKOHAMA. The possible outcome of the war says: Japan's success in the first engagement of the war with China was of considerable importance and is likely to increase the war feeling at the Japanese capital. The action, it appears, occurred off Foutan, an island of Corea, and was between a squadron of Japanese warships and a fleet of transports conveying Chinese soldiers to Corea, under convoy of several Chinese warships.

FEEDING WHEAT TO HOGS. The farmers of Indiana for the first time in the history of the state are feeding wheat to their hogs and selling their corn. Wheat brings 42c a bushel when delivered at the country stations, and corn sells for 20c. The farmers say that if the report is true, it means that an end has been put to the power of China, so far as fighting Japan upon the sea is concerned.

FRUIT PEACHES IN CALIFORNIA. The fruit receipts at San Francisco this week were unusually large. At the wharves alone over 24,000 boxes of fruit of different varieties were landed. The bulk of the market was so great that peaches were disposed of at 10 cents per basket. Peas sold correspondingly low. Extra cabbages have been put on the market here and capacity of the regular steamers not being great enough to move the rapidly ripening fruit crop.
